

Heeding calls to refresh Reservation Profiles prompted a complete renovation... with the goal of designing a tool that reflects Indian Country's places and people.

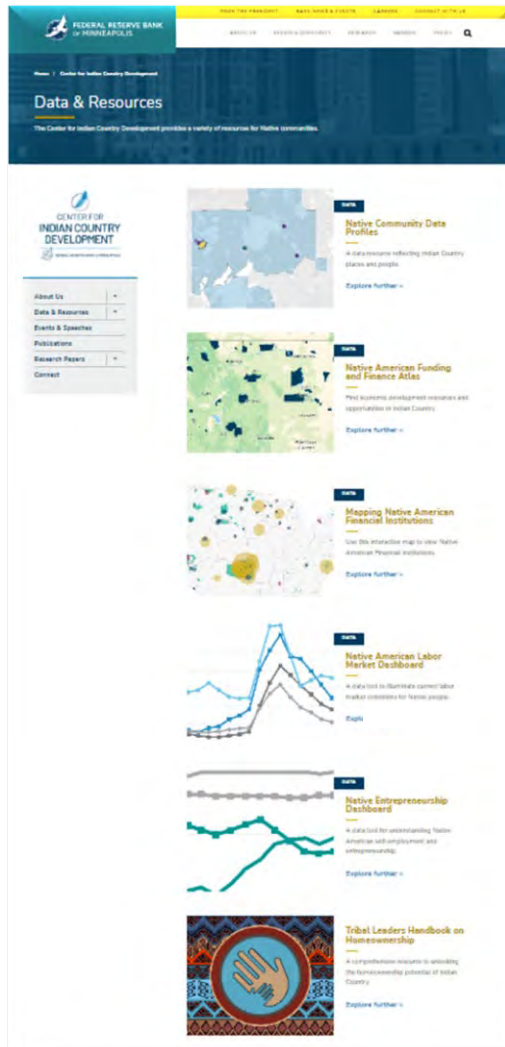
Purpose

Scaling up representation... in design

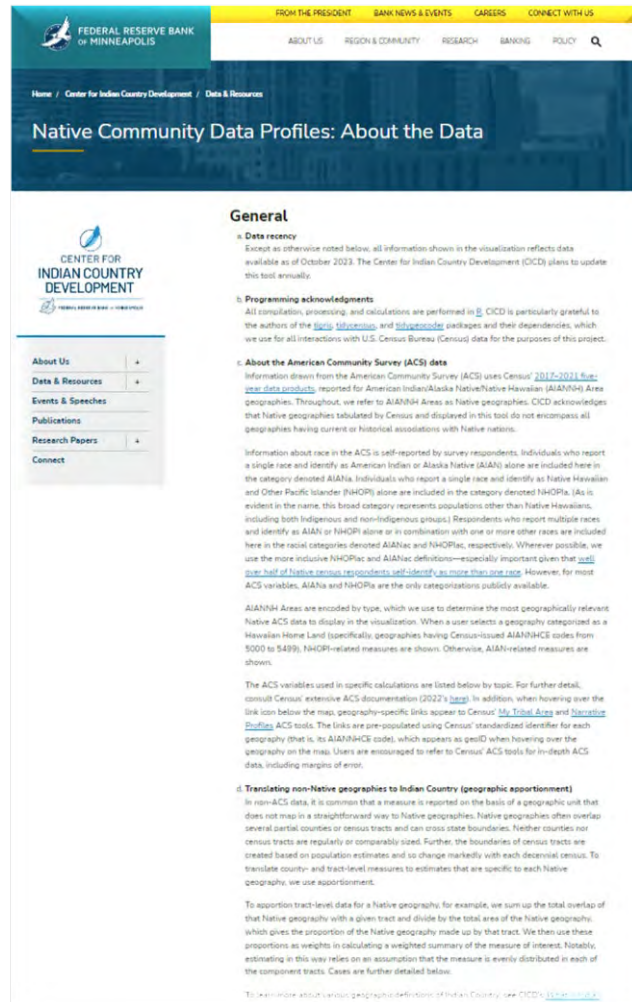


New design **expands access to information** for community members and stakeholders to **harness for economic self-determination.**

- **Enhancements from the 2017 version include:**
 - Data updated to the most recent available as of October
 - **Now includes all available Native geographies,** including state-recognized reservations, Native Hawaiian Homelands, Alaska Native Village Statistical Areas, and joint-use areas
 - Refreshed, interactive, and mobile-friendly design
 - Smooth process for future updates

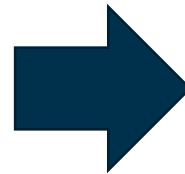

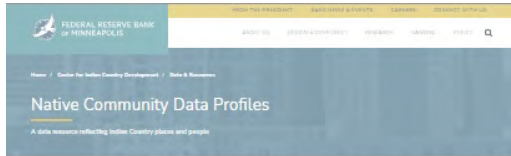

- **AI/AN/AL:** AI/AN alone or in combination with one or more other races, and
- **NHOPI/AL:** NHOPI alone or in combination with one or more other races.

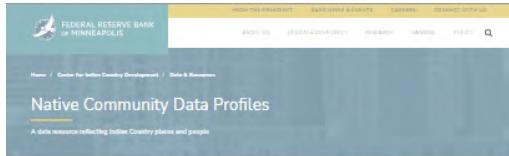

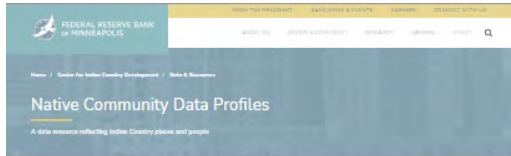
